Workshop Descriptions

11TH ANNUAL TECHNIQUE MASTER CLASS—ALL YOU EVER WANTED TO KNOW:

Presenter: Steffen Trekel

This workshop is open to everyone who plays an eight-string instrument. We will cover nearly every mandolin technique from the typical easy single-tone techniques to more difficult tremolo techniques. Most of the exercises we will play are from Johann Pachelbel's Cannon so that each time we play a technique, it will sound beautiful and will be familiar to everyone. Questions are welcome and will make for an interesting, helpful and lively workshop! I'm sure we will have a good time!

ACHIEVING ARTISTRY IN PERFORMANCE

Presenter: Jim Bates

The correct notes, dynamics and articulations are just the midpoint toward shaping your artistic performance. This workshop will provide some ideas for taking it the rest of the way.

BACH ON THE LIUTO (AND MANDOLONCELLO AND MANDOLIOLA): THE CELLO SUITES

Presenter: Robert A. Margo

History of the Bach cello suites, editions, recordings, and performance issues on plucked instruments. Selected movements will be examined in class. Primarily for CGDA mandolin family instruments but all are welcome. Music will be available in bass, alto, and 8va treble clefs (original keys only).

BASIC TECHNIQUES ON THE CLASSICAL GUITAR

Presenter: Michael Tröster

A workshop dedicated to refining basic technical skills on the classical guitar: stroking, speed, sound coloring, arpeggios, slurs, and position changes.

CHORD THEORY AND HARMONY FOR THE CLASSICAL MANDOLINIST

Presenter: Tim Connell

Classical mandolinists, like their bowed string counterparts, deal so much with reading single-line parts that they are frequently a little in the dark when it comes to harmony, chords and theory. In this workshop, Tim will help shed light on the wonderful world of harmony, exploring the ways that multiple single lines come together to form chords ("harmony") and how harmony can shape the structure of a piece as well as influence the emotional aspect of the piece. After a brief review of basic scale and chord theory (major/minor scales, triads, 1-3-5-7), Tim will lead the class through a reading of Bach chorales, with an analysis of the chords and chord progressions that are suggested by the four individual parts. We will focus particularly on ear-training — learning to hear the sound of various scale tones and chord progressions. Students will leave this workshop with knowledge of how to form triads and 7th chords anywhere on the neck (with handouts for review at home), copies of the pieces analyzed in class, and a copy of the ear-training "chord diamond" diagram used in class.

DON'T WORRY, BE HAPPY! HOW TO WORK WITH PERFORMANCE ANXIETY

Presenter: Judy Handler

It is possible to enjoy playing for others! We will all share our experiences about some of the causes and symptoms of performance anxiety. Judy will highlight some common myths about performing and present some important skills that will help you to prepare for success in future performances.

EXPLORING CLASSICAL MANDOLIN

Presenter: August Watters

Exploring Classical Mandolin presents the core of August Watters' forthcoming book (Berklee Press), a practice method for contemporary classical mandolin based on techniques both historical and new. Topics include intervallic studies, compound picking patterns, chord voice leading, and split-string technique.

EXPLORING THE ART OF ARRANGING FOR MANDOLIN AND GUITAR

Presenters: Judy Handler and Mark Levesque

Judy and Mark blend Brazilian, Latin American, gypsy, classical and folk music influences to create their sophisticated and expressive arrangements. They will discuss some of the skills and techniques that contribute to making an interesting arrangement. Judy and Mark will demonstrate these ideas by playing sections from some of their arrangements.

FOLK MANDOLIN IMPROVISATION

Presenter: Brian Oberlin

Gliding along the fingerboard, using diatonic movement, harmony, and voice-leading, playing a catchy lick in between a G and a C chord, scale knowledge actually put to use. These are some of the many ideas we will learn in this workshop while playing American folk music. (swing, folk, bluegrass, polkas, and so on). Mandolin (treble clef), mandola (alto clef) and mandocello (bass clef) players are welcome. Everyone will have charts in notation and tab.

IDIOMATIC MUSIC: OR, WHY SOME THINGS WORK ON SOME INSTRUMENTS AND OTHERS DON'T

Presenter: Keith Harris

Players in plucked string ensembles often comment that music I write is fun to play. That makes me very happy of course, and I certainly try to write music that fits the instruments. I also hope that audiences like hearing the music. In this workshop, we can try out various examples and talk about ideas like "suitable" and "unsuitable" at least in regard to instrumental technique. Of course there is a strong connection with one's view views on instrumental technique itself, and opinions about this subject differ widely. My own students, who know my way of thinking, usually instantly see what I am getting at, whereas others some-

times ask, "why not just do it the usual way?" "Because it just doesn't work! Can't you hear that?" I want to answer despairingly. In this workshop, I will try to explain what I mean, and perhaps you will start to develop criteria for "suitability". I think the examination will be fun.

INTRODUCTION TO BRAZILIAN CHORO

Presenter: Tim Connell

A Brazilian cousin of Dixieland and Ragtime that prominently features the mandolin, choro has experienced a revival in the last few decades in Brazil and increased popularity in North America. In this workshop, we'll hear samples of the genre's form, rhythms and idiosyncrasies, and learn to play a few classics of the repertoire. Take-home sheet music provided.

MANDO FOR KIDS TRAINING WORKSHOP

Presenters: Sue Lesser, Laura Norris and Susan McLaughlin

Can you see yourself in the role of Teacher, helping children learn the art of playing classical mandolin? This workshop will provide you with the tools and confidence necessary to get started. Join Laura Norris as she takes us through the core components incorporated into the four levels of her Mando For Kids[©] curriculum. We will begin by using the Storytelling material to show how much can be learned about the sounds of the mandolin and how exhilarating it is for all concerned.

Participants will have a chance to work with actual students during the third part of this session which will be Thursday evening. We will learn how to keep children motivated at each successive Workbook level through the use of Jingles and Games and through progressively more sophisticated lessons in Ear Training, Ensemble Work, Articulation, Rhythm and Picking. This third session will be open to all participants at this year's convention. These concepts are reinforced through a wealth of material in the Mary Variations and the Repertoire library. Time permitting, we will also discuss some of the practical aspects of starting a Mando For Kids[©] program in your own community, including funding, marketing and community partnerships.

MEDIEVAL AND RENAISSANCE MUSIC FOR MANDOLIN

Presenter: Aleks Alexander

Medieval and renaissance music for mandolin in a group setting of duets or trios. Creating simple voices and adding different rhythms to produce the unique sound of the period will be covered. All mandolin family instruments welcome; please note that sheet music will be available in treble clef only.

METER

Presenter: Steffen Trekel

The meter is one of the most important musical parameters. It helps us to understand music, listen music and to interpret it. It is extremely important for good rhythmic playing, playing together in an ensemble or orchestra, to cue your musical partners and much more.

MUSIC FOR MANDOLIN AND GUITAR ENSEMBLE: NEW DIRECTIONS

Presenters: Mark Davis and Beverly Davis

Is your mandolin orchestra looking for fresh and exciting new music to perform? This workshop will survey recent trends, focusing on the "American" repertoire of the Providence Mandolin Orchestra and the New American Mandolin Ensemble. We'll read through a few select pieces in class, so bring your instruments! Music parts in treble clef for mandolins, 8va treble for mandola and classical guitar, and bass clef for mandocello and string bass.

SIGHT READING I & II

Presenter: Antonina Nigrelli

Practice in playing on first sight; what to look for and how to approach a new piece. Lots of new music, as usual! Transposed mandola and mandocello parts available.

SOCIAL MEDIA FOR MANDOLINISTS

This workshop focuses on the basics of four key social media tools (Twitter, Facebook, YouTube, and Skype) and how to use them effectively for musicians and musical groups. This workshop will cover unique and effective views on improvisation and their application in real time, handy rhythm techniques that improve style and expose mistakes, and a large helping of swing chords and melodies, all culminating in an approach to play mandolin for sport, not just play. It is with pleasure the Classical Mandolin Society of American announces its Composer-in-Residence, Keith Harris.

Some of you may remember Keith as conductor of the 1990, 1995, 1996 and 1998 En Masse Orchestras. In case this is your first introduction to Keith, here is some information:

• Keith Harris won first prize in a radio competition when he was 10, began teaching at 12, and gave his first 20 minute live radio recital (for the Australian Broadcasting Commission's "Young Australia" series) when he was 14.



- He has performed in every conceivable context from intimate recitals in San Francisco, Sydney or Brussels to concertos as soloist with the Slovakian Philharmonic (left-at the world premiere of the Armin Kaufmann Mandolin Concerto) or the Vienna Mozart Orchestra.
- Keith Harris became interested in conducting while still at secondary school in Australia. His first conducting experience was with the Sydney Domra Ensemble, directing a mixed instrumental ensemble for a Polish Dance Company. Keith has been conductor for the Hessian State Plucked String Orchestra (both adult group and its youth counterpart) in Germany. Keith directed the CMSA En Masse orchestras several times in the 1990's, and, in 2003, the European Guitar and Mandolin Youth Orchestra in Greece.
- Keith is also a highly regarded composer. Examples of his works include Diamantina Suite, Boccherini Fandango, Reunion Russe, and Three Miniatures.

About Portland ...

TRANSPORTATION

The heart of Portland, where you will find the City's best restaurants, attractions, and shopping opportunities, is just a few miles from the Red Lion. The Hotel concierge would be happy to help arrange transportation to downtown Portland where most of the "action" is. The Red Lion also has a shuttle bus that will take you to our light rail system, the MAX Train.

From the MAX Train, you can obtain transfers and travel by bus or streetcar to almost every place in town. If you are traveling by car, street parking in downtown Portland can be hard to find and rather expensive, but there are numerous and convenient parking garages in most areas. Pioneer Courthouse Square at 701 SW Sixth Street is sometimes called the "living room" of Portland. The Visitor's Center is located here. It is open every day. (M-F 8:30 –5:30, Sat. 10:00 – 4:00, Sun. 10:00 – 2:00) The phone number is (503) 275-8355. Downtown Portland (Southwest) is located about seven miles from the Red Lion and will cost approximately \$25-\$35 to go by taxi. A MAX ticket is \$2.50 for two hours or \$5.00 for all day—fares are cheaper for folks 65 years or older. The concierge will know where to buy tickets. There is also a smart phone app to buy tickets in advance. A streetcar in downtown Portland runs mostly north and south and costs only a dollar, or you can use the MAX pass. It will take you by Powell's City of Books and over to the Pearl District (Northwest Portland).

THINGS TO DO

Portland is divided into North, Northeast, Southeast, Northwest and Southwest areas with the Willamette River (pronounced Will-AM-ette) and Burnside Street being the dividing lines. The City is famous for its bookstores, craft breweries, coffee roasters, food carts, and beautiful gardens. The Japanese Garden and International Rose Test Garden in Washington Park are both world class. The Chinese Garden in Old Town (Northwest) is equally amazing. Old Town also has Ground Kontrol Classic Arcade for pinball and arcade games from the '70s and '80s. One can spend hours in Powell's City of Books (West Burnside Street), the world's largest independently owned bookstore.

TOURS

There are several types of Portland tours available: brewery tours, food tours, winery tours, and tours on bikes. One free walking tour is called "Secrets of Portlandia" and meets in front of the courthouse (in Pioneer Courthouse Square) daily at 11:00 am. It takes about two hours and is very entertaining. If you have access to the Internet, Trip Advisor has some great suggestions for singles or families.

About Portland, cont...

DOWNTOWN

Some suggestions for restaurants downtown are Higgins, Mother's Bistro, Jake's Famous Crawfish, and Deschutes Brewery. The City Grill, which is on the thirty-third floor of the U.S. Bancorp Tower (fondly referred to as "Big Pink"), has a 360-degree view of the City. If you like views, there is an aerial tram that goes up to Oregon Health Sciences University and back for \$4.35 (debit/credit only). It takes four minutes to get up the hill and leaves every six minutes (closed on Sundays). Even though there are some Chinese gates and a Chinese Garden around Old Town (north of W. Burnside), most Asian restaurants are on the east side on Sandy Boulevard or 82nd Avenue.

There are cinemas that serve beer, wine and pizza. For shopping, try the outdoor Saturday market (also open on Sunday) off of West Burnside, near the river, where you will find unique arts and crafts for sale, listen to live music, and try out some of the City's famous food carts. North of Powell's Books is the Pearl District (Northwest), with its many fancy boutiques and restaurants sprinkled among the expensive condos. NW 23rd and NW 21st Streets off of West Burnside also have great shops and restaurants.

EAST SIDE

On the East side, some neighborhoods that have a nice vibe are Alberta Street, Mississippi Avenue, and the Hawthorne/Belmont District. They all have interesting shops and unique restaurants. There is an authentic English pub called the Horse Brass at 45th and SE Belmont that has over 50 craft beers on tap and the best fish and chips in town. The Kennedy School is a wonderful place to spend an afternoon or evening. Formerly an elementary school, it was turned into a hotel, restaurant, music venue, bar and movie theater by the McMennamin brothers. It has typical pub food, and you can smoke cigars in the "Detention Hall" bar. The Kennedy School is located on NE 33rd Avenue at the east end of Alberta Street. SE Division Street (aka "Restaurant Row") is worth the trip - PokPok (Thai street food), Bollywood (Indian), Clay's Smoke House (BBQ), Salt and Straw (ice cream), Imperial Bottle Shop (beer), and Sen Yai Noodles, to name a few.
