The CMSA is a non-profit society the purpose of which is to promote and support the art of classical mandolin playing in North America. It was formed in 1986 by Norman Levine, a businessman, publisher and philanthropist who has been called "the financial and spiritual impresario of the mandolin world." Norman saw mandolin organizations in Europe and had the vision of a similar North American community of mandolinists.

The CMSA provides education and resources to support existing and new orchestras, including grants for teaching and promotion, materials and instruments. It also publishes the Mandolin Journal and hosts mandolin instruction workshops and contests to promote better playing. Since the CMSA was formed, interest in classical mandolin has surged and new mandolin orchestras have been formed in Atlanta, Louisville, Minneapolis, Nashville, Dayton and Montreal.

The CMSA has over 400 members representing most U.S. states and Canadian provinces and several other countries. Members include mandolinists, guitarists, mandola and mandocello players, conductors, teachers and composers. Members have a variety of backgrounds from bluegrass to jazz to classical. Playing ability ranges from beginners to professionals.

The CMSA has held an annual convention in a different city every year since 1987 to bring together fans of classical music on mandolin. The CMSA offers scholarships to allow students to attend the convention. Through the convention and other CMSA efforts, interest in the mandolin continues to grow as more people are attracted to the beauty of its sound and discover the joy of making music with other people.





## EN MASSE ORCHESTRA

The CMSA En Masse Orchestra is one of the largest gatherings of plucked-string instruments in the world. The 2017 orchestra is conducted by Dr. Jim Bates, and will include music by Victor Kioulaphides, the convention's Composer-in-Residence.



**DR. JIM BATES** returns as Conductor of the En Masse Orchestra. Jim is a professor of music at Otterbein University in Ohio and principal bassist in the Westerville Symphony. He is on the conducting staff of the Interlochen Center for the Arts and co-directs the Junior Orchestra program and Junior String Institute there in the summer.

Jim draws on considerable experience as an educator, performer and historian. He has served as a clinician or guest conductor in Ohio, Kentucky, Virginia, New York, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Minnesota, California, Missouri, Pennsylvania and Colorado. He has served as president of Kentucky ASTA and as string coordinator for the Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts. Jim is an active performer on the

double bass and various early music instruments such as the viola da gamba, recorder and the medieval vielle. He has degrees from the University of Louisville (B.M.E.), a Master's in double bass performance from Indiana University and a Ph.D. in Musicology from the University of Kentucky.



VICTOR KIOULAPHIDES is the CMSA 2017 Composer-in-Residence.

Mr. Kioulaphides was born in Athens, Greece and in 1979 moved to New York, where he studied double bass and composition at The Juilliard School and the Manhattan School of Music. He is currently a faculty member at the Lucy Moses School at the Kaufman Music Center and was formerly a faculty member at the Brooklyn Conservatory. Victor's compositions are widely published and performed around the world.

Victor is a member of ASCAP, American Music Center, and American

Federation of Musicians, and published by Hal Leonard Corp., Joachim Trekel Verlag, Liben Music Publishers, Wolfhead Music, the New York Classical Guitar Society, and Fiori Musicali. His works have been performed at Carnegie Recital Hall, Merkin Hall, the 92nd Street Y, The Salon Theatre, CAMI Hall, and Berklee College of Music. He has performed in the Netherlands, Germany, Italy, Spain, France, Belgium, Argentina, Romania, Bolivia, Japan, Russia, Cuba, Bulgaria, Croatia, and Greece. Victor Kioulphides has received commissions from neXus Arts, Het Consort (Netherlands), the Kammerorchester Riegelsberg (Germany), the New York Classical Guitar Society, Trinity Lutheran / St. Michael's Episcopal Church, The Diller-Quaile School, Davka Dances, and numerous individual performers. He has received the annual AscaPlus Award since 1993, as well as Composer Assistance Program grants from The American Music Center in 1999, 2001, 2004, and 2005.



JULIEN MARTINEAU (THURSDAY EVENING DUO WITH RENE IZQUIERDO; FRIDAY EVENING MANDOLIN SOLOIST; WEDNESDAY MASTERCLASS)



Julien Martineau is one of the few mandolin players in Europe to lead a concert career. From age 16 he began to give several private concerts with the pianist Alexandre Tharaud and performances at Opéra de Paris. As a student at the Lycée Condorcet in Paris, Julien discovered a fascinating musical world that led him to choose a musical career over one of science. From then on he began to explore the repertoire for the mandolin,


perfected his instrument with the top makers, and developed a new set of strings with Savarez, all while continuing his musicology studies at the Sorbonne and at the Conservatoire National Superieur de Musique et de Danse (CNSM) in Paris. In 1998, at age 19, he won the Giuseppe Anedda Prize at the Varazze International Mandolin Competition in Italy. In 2002, he obtained his Master of Music from the Sorbonne in Paris.

Julien Martineau performs as a soloist in the world's leading concert halls and festivals, including: Théâtre du Châtelet, Théâtre des Champs-Elysées and the Sorbonne in Paris; Grand Théâtre d'Aix-en-Provence; Halle aux Grains in Toulouse; Victoria Hall and the Grand Théâtre in Geneva; Festival de Besançon; and Music Atlantico in the Azores. With Bertrand Chamayou, he has created a programme of sonatas for mandolin and piano dating from the 18th century to the present day. Julien has collaborated with Jean-François Zygel on several concerts, and accompanies singers including Natalie Dessay, Thomas Hampson, Ludovic Tézier, Florian Sempey and Laurent Naouri.

In 2013 he recorded the complete Preludes by Raffaele Calace for solo mandolin, which are considered on par with Paganini's Caprices for the violin. At the same time, the French Institute organized a tour for him of 15 concerts across 11 African countries. The Orchestre National du Capitole de Toulouse invited Martineau in 2014 to perform the Vivaldi Concertos, conducted by Rinaldo Alessandrini, and in 2016 to present the world premiere of Mandolin Concerto by Karol Beffa. Since 2015, Julien Martineau records for Naïve.

Julien Martineau has been a Professor at the Conservatoire de Toulouse since 2005 and, in 2013, the Academie des Arts, Lettres et Sciences in Languedoc honoured him with the Déodat de Séverac Prize.

ALON SARIEL (THURSDAY EVENING DUO WITH RENE IZQUIERDO; SATURDAY EVENING MANDOLIN SOLOIST; TECHNIQUE CLASS TUESDAY AND WEDNESDAY)



Alon Sariel was born in Beersheba, Israel, and frequently appears as a mandolinist, lutenist and conductor in the fields of early and new music. He has performed numerous contemporary works written specially for him. Concert tours have taken him to internationally renowned festivals, including the Salzburg Biennale for New Music and the Utrecht Early Music Festival, and to major stages including the Berlin Philharmonie and La Scala in Milan. His openness to other genres, from folk to avant-garde, has united him in concerts with eminent champions of various styles. Notable performance partners include the great soprano Emma Kirkby, the outstanding trumpeter Markus Stockhausen, violinist Jean-Christophe Spinosi, accordionist and banjo player Stian Carstensen and

clarinettist David Krakauer. Engagements as a soloist and conductor have seen him perform with the Munich Chamber Orchestra, the Jerusalem Radio Symphony Orchestra, the Sofi a Philharmonic, the Tel Aviv Soloists and the Barokksolistene ensemble in Norway.

Alon Sariel has won international competitions, received prizes and accolades and is involved in music and social projects including Live Music Now (Yehudi Menuhin), Rhapsody in School (Lars Vogt) and the West-Eastern Divan Orchestra (Daniel Barenboim). As a soloist and member of various ensembles he has toured Europe, the USA, Mexico, the Middle East and the Far East. He has given master classes at such universities as Trinity College of Music in London, the Lilla Akademien in Stockholm and the conservatories of Kazan, Russia, and Celaya, Mexico. He also appears in the global media and on broadcasting stations including Arte, BBC4, BR, WDR3, P2 Klassiskt, Kol HaMusica, and WQXR.

Sariel's discography encompasses world premieres including trios for plucked instruments by Paul Ben-Haim (Albany Records) and Yehezkel Braun (IMI), the composition Nedudim (wanderings) for mandolin and string orchestra by Gilad Hochman (with the Deutsches Kammerorchester Berlin for the Neue Meister concert series) and the album Paisiello in Vienna, a highly acclaimed release by Brilliant Classics that marked the 200th anniversary of the Italian composer's death. In addition to his work as artistic director of the international ensemble Concerto Foscari, Alon Sariel is a founding member of the PRISMA quartet, with which he won first prize at the International H.I.F. Biber Competition in Austria in 2015. Telemandolin is Alon's debut CD for Berlin Classics. On Telemandolin, Alon Sariel and his ensemble Concerto Foscari present a diverse compilation of remarkable works by the great German composer, Georg Philipp Telemann, on the 250th anniversary of Telemann's death.



**RENÉ IZQUIERDO** (GUITAR - PERFORMING THURSDAY EVENING DUOS WITH EACH OF JULIEN MARTINEAU AND ALON SARIEL; TECHNIQUE CLASS TUESDAY AND WEDNESDAY)

Rene Izquierdo is a native from Cuba, graduated from the Guillermo Tomas, Amadeo Roldan Conservatory and Superior Institute of Art in Havana. In the United States, Mr. Izquierdo earned a Master of Music and an Artist Diploma degrees from the Yale University School of Music, where he studied with Benjamin Verdery. While at Yale he represented the university in an exchange program with the Conservatoire National de Musique et de Danse du Paris and worked with guitarists Olivie Chassain and Roland Dyens. Rene has

appeared as a guest soloist and in chamber music concerts throughout the U.S., Cuba and Europe. He has shared the stage with prestigious guitarists including Eliot Fisk, Benjamin Verdery and Jorge Morel, as well as renowned flutist Ransom Wilson, soprano Lucy Shelton, David Jolley and Paquito d'Rivera. Renowned composers such as Jorge Morel and Carlos R. Rivera have dedicated works to him.

Rene is the winner of many competitions including the JoAnn Falletta International Guitar, Extremadura International Guitar, Schadt String, and Stotsenberg International Guitar competitions. He is currently a professor of classical guitar at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and an active solo performer and chamber musician.

MISHA LITVIN (DOMRA) & STAS VENGLEVSKI (BAYAN) (FRIDAY EVENING CONCERT)



Misha Litvin is a master mandolinist and domra (Russianstyle mandolin) player. He has soloed with chamber orchestras in Russia, Italy, Germany and elsewhere, and is a professor of mandolin at the Wisconsin Conservatory of Music. He is originally from Minsk, Belarus and holds a Master's Degree in orchestra conducting and music education. Misha performs frequently with Stas and other duet partners in the United States and around the world.

**Stas Venglevski** hails from the Republic of Moldova, where he is a two-time first prize winner of Bayan competition. Under the tutelage of famed Russian Bayanist, Friedrich Lips, Stas earned a Master's Degree in Music from the

Russian Academy of Music in Moscow. In 1992 he immigrated to the United States. His repertoire includes his own original compositions and a broad range of classical, ethnic and contemporary music. He has toured extensively as a soloist throughout the former Soviet Union, Canada, Europe, and the United States, including numerous performances with Doc Severinsen, Steve Allen, and Garrison Keillor on the Prairie Home Companion Show. Stas has performed with symphony orchestras throughout the United States. He performed the world premiere of Concerto No. 2 by Anthony Galla-Rini and also the world premiere of Bayan and Beyond, composed for Stas by Dan Lawitts.

THE MILWAUKEE MANDOLIN ORCHESTRA (FRIDAY EVENING CONCERT; THE CONVENTION HOSTS)



The Bonne Amie Musical Circle, under the performance name "Milwaukee Mandolin Orchestra (MMO)," was founded in 1900 and has been in continuous operation in Milwaukee since that time. Led by Music Director Rene Izquierdo, the MMO's repertoire centers on the best in traditional American mandolin orchestra music (waltzes, tangos, marches and polkas) plus classical, modern, Italian and Latin numbers. The MMO regularly performs its unique repertoire at music festivals and concert halls around Wisconsin and surrounding states. Twice, the MMO

THE DON STIERNBERG TRIO (WEDNESDAY PARTY PERFORMERS; WORKSHOP PRESENTER)



While still in his teens, Don Stiernberg learned to play the mandolin from the innovative and influential virtuoso Jethro Burns. Jethro referred to Don as his "graduate student", hired him to play in his band, and guided him to a career as a professional musician which has already lasted for decades. A leading exponent of jazz mandolin style, Don has nine recording projects of his own and appears on many others by a variety of artists in all styles. The most recent of these is "Good Numbers", a jazz CD by the trio. The numbers include standards, jazz tunes and one original.

The trio includes two renowned Chicago jazz musicians. Guitarist Andy Brown is known for his brilliance with all facets of guitar playing, blazing solo lines, and his own unique chordal style. Jim Cox is everyone's favorite bass player, with performance and recording credentials ranging from Earl Hines to Judy Roberts to Marian McPartland to Rosemary Clooney and countless others. The trio has performed from Portland east to Portland west as well as overseas visits to festivals in Germany and Brazil. Their style might be described as swinging interpretations of accessible jazz material played acoustically on mandolin (and occasional vocal), guitar, and bass. Or in short... Good Pickin' on the Good Numbers.
